

Chapman's Goldenrod Solidago chapmanii



With golden flowers, this species of goldenrod grows in clumps. The leaves are smooth and twist slightly. One of the best goldenrods for home landscaping. It is extremely adaptable to most landscape settings (except soils that are too wet) and better behaved than most other species. Chapman's goldenrod is deciduous. By early summer, it reaches its mature height of about 3 feet and begins blooming. Blooming can occur over a wide variety of months, but is most common to the summer months. This species suckers, but not aggressively. Goldenrod species are often blamed for allergies, but their pollen is insect borne and not airborne; its ragweed – which blooms at the same time – that is to blame.
