



A member of the grass family, this plant produces drooping branches that have reddish-purple spikelets. With huge numbers of these plants together, they put a purple top on fields. In the fall, the plant turns brown. This plant can grow in sandy to loamy or clay soils. It is a larval host to at least 4 species of butterflies, most of which are skippers.

Perennial - Grows 2-7 feet - Found in old fields, open woods, roadsides
